HISTORY OF THE FLAT RIVER MUSEUM - Part 3 Final - 1980s to Present

PHASE 3, the renovation of the lower basement level was begun about 1981, once the city removed the last of its park equipment to a new storage building nearby. Plans included three period rooms to depict shops for blacksmith, carpenter and harness maker, as well as displays of home and agricultural nature. Cost of basement work would be about \$7500 and the completion goal was 1982. However, with expenses for moving the Eureka Township Hall to the museum site and updates to the exterior of the museum building, it was March of 1983 before the basement was finally completed and opened.

By 1986, the museum had recorded 34,000 visitors since its dedication in 1972! During Michigan's Sesquicentennial in 1987, a new loading dock, ramp and door were completed, needed office items donated, and other enhancements were made.

For Greenville's Sesquicentennial in 1994, many special events were held and a history book was published and sold. The first military encampment was held and became an annual event for five years. During 1997, the 25th anniversary of the museum, a replica Silver theater was created on the main floor with a small stage and theater-type seats.

Around 2000, community members with a passion to rebuild the famous Fighting Falcon glider found a new home in the former school administration building on Cass Street and the military artifacts from the Eureka hall and museum were donated to them for their new military museum. The industrial artifacts from an area in the museum's second floor were moved to the Eureka hall in 2001 and additional period rooms took their place upstairs. In 2002 the basement display area was updated and spruced up.

Outside, work began in 2006 to create a Victorian garden in the yard and on the hill, with assistance of Boy Scouts and many others. Rocks were brought in and bricks from old city streets were laid for the pathways. A waterfall was added in 2007 and the area became a photographer's paradise.

Designers of the garden, Jennifer Simon and Julie Johansen, accepted the Michigan Museums Association's award for Institutional Achievement.

In 2012 the Superintendent of Greenville Public Schools humbly requested the return of the 1912 school clock that had been installed in the front of the museum, to be used in the fieldhouse of the new Legacy Field. The museum agreed to return the clock, once arrangements were made for local craftsman Jack Bailey to create a beautiful stained-glass window to take its place and fill the big round hole.



The window design depicts founder John Green overlooking the Flat River toward the tall pine tree on the opposite side.

With a hundred years from the school (1912) to the field (2012), it was dubbed the "Centennial Clock" and the Class of 1962 raised funds for a descriptive plaque at the field. It was a win-win situation for all and again shows the community spirit of Greenville.

Another example of community can be seen in downtown Greenville, where historical research from the museum helped to create interpretive panels to show pictures and history of what present-day buildings were like in the past. The historical society received the 2017 COGG Spirit of Collaboration Award for that endeavor and for its school programming.

A grant request for renovation of the entry and main floor of the museum resulted in a Greenville Area Foundation Challenge Grant of \$150,000, along with a consultant stipend to help raise the funds. The "Bridging the Generations" drive was wholeheartedly supported by the community and resulted in more than the original goal. Strategic planning sessions resulted in a new logo for the museum as well as many plans and ideas for the future, with a professional exhibit designer guiding designs and creations.

A new entry porch, steps and ramp were constructed, while inside, the walls of the main floor were sandblasted to remove paint, ceilings were painted black and new flooring installed. A large back room was turned into an educational center with a Native American setting and authentic wigwam at one end and a log cabin fur trading post at the other end. A Ribbon-Cutting Event for this first phase was held August 27, 2019.

New exhibits continued to be added to form a chronological history of the community, from ancient seas and ice age to modern day industries and Meijer stores. The garden and pathways which had been disheveled by construction were put back in order, and outdoor artifacts were added and labeled to create an exterior museum that can be viewed even when museum is closed.

The COVID pandemic in 2020 kept the museum closed to visitors, but much work was safely done by volunteer board members and others, in spite of it. The entire office was emptied and renovated and updated. A team of four board members worked daily to inventory, clean and restage the entire second floor period rooms. A storage room was emptied, painted, and outfitted with new shelves and workspace. Accumulated acquisitions were accessed and a new website was created. New wiring and other necessities were completed.

The museum finally reopened with health precautions in spring, 2021. An intern was added in 2021 and did many tasks as she learned about museum operations. Plans were begun for celebrating the 50-year anniversary of the museum in 2022, as well as the 55-year anniversary of the historical society.

During the museum's 50th year in 2022, many special events and activities were planned to celebrate!

A grand re-opening reception in April unveiled some commemorative glasses, pins, and medallions. A Golden Anniversary Golf Outing in June brought together business and sports for a day of fun. A lovely tea party in the Victorian garden featured a string quartet for ambiance.

A new Baldwin Lake exhibit in the lower level was unveiled and dedicated with the GHS Class of 1964 who supported it and visited by Baldwin Lake Association members.

In August, we celebrated the Meijer Sandy Horse 60th Birthday Party, marched in the Danish Festival Parade and reached out with a ham radio event. A Grandparent Day in September provided a generational photo op. Several work days sorted out the crowded Eureka building and determined renovation needs.

During the year, we were visited by Fox 17 for a TV program and gave information for WOOD TV8 feature program. We were honored to receive the Greenville Public Schools "School Bell Award" for our collaboration with students. We received the Historical Society of Michigan's 2022 Society Award and Robin Walter received their Educator Award. Keep Michigan Beautiful also selected us for their President's Award for the garden and yard beauty and education.

The rededication of the museum October 10, exactly 50 years from the original dedication, featured city, state and historical presentations, as well as introduction of a time capsule. A student who unlocked the door 50 years ago was present to reenact the event.

Looking back, we appreciate all the support and encouragement from our community that helped create the Flat River Historical Museum fifty years ago and continues to sustain it in the present day. We look forward to a future of continued community interest and participation through memberships, donations, events and the investments to and income from our endowment fund.

Thank you to everyone who believes in and supports the Flat River Historical Society and Museum.

(Looking ahead, we hope to do some renovations on the Eureka Town Hall building to make it more useful.)
