Celebrating 150 Years: 1873---2023

We're happy to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the first graduating class of Greenville High School in 1873! Graduates were Wellington G. Clark, Mary Emily Fish, Milo Lewis, Henry A. Jersey, Charles R. Rarden, Mary Satterlee, Thomas B. Wilson, and Ariel L. Wilson. (Let us know if you are a descendent of any of them!) Many stayed in/returned to Greenville to serve the community. The class motto was "Cor Unum, Via Una" which means "One Heart, One Way". Photos and brief bios of the eight graduates, as well as an actual diploma of one of the grads is on display in the main floor exhibit case, along with a picture of the school they attended and a copy of their graduation ceremony program. Who was J.T. Ridley?....."From EGGS to Exhibits" has the answer!

You've probably seen pictures of our museum building back in the days when it had the J.T. Ridley name on the side or roof. So, who was this J.T. Ridley—and what did he use this building for?

James T. Ridley was a wholesaler of butter and eggs in the 1890s and bought the old barn in 1902 to house his growing business. In 1904, fire destroyed the building leaving only the foundation. Ridley rebuilt what is now the present museum building and resumed operations by 1905, continuing to ship his products cross country until selling in 1925 due to health. He died in 1928. Photos and artifacts of his business are in the new display titled "From EGGS to Exhibits".

Eggs, butter and breakfast are included on the center shelf as part of our "Feeding the Family" theme and the bottom shelf has other artifacts from the chicken/egg business. (Be sure and look for the chicken wearing glasses!)
